Each student in the class should rank these attributes in importance (1 most important - 12 least important) and then take

a few minutes to justify his/her ranking before the rest of the class.

7. Considering the list of item 2. Which attributes does Robert not have control over?
8. How can Robert improve his education if he can't afford to go back to school?
9. How can Robert improve his honesty?
10. How can Robert improve his attitude?
11. How can Robert spend time in the Bible consistently without giving up?
12. How can Robert acquire good connections?

13. How can Robert get a good wife?
14. How can Robert find the right church for him?
15. How can Robert improve his social graces and manners?
16. How can Robert build his knowledge?
